# Word from the Pastor BE THANKFUL



Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. (Colossians 3:15)

Colossians 3:15 starts with the phrase "Let the peace of Christ..." and v. 16 starts with "Let the word of Christ...". In between you find the two words BE THANKFUL. Ungrateful are not those who don't have but they are those who are not thankful for all things in life. Throughout the Bible you find many examples of people who were thankful to God and to other people for who they became in life and for the things they had received in their lives. We seldom say thank you to even our own family members because we either take them and their contribution for granted or there is a sense of entitlement wherewith we do not esteem them as individuals who need to be appreciated.
- 2. ...build one another in the most holy faith..(Jude 1:20) We can make this a habit to be thankful to God because He sends people who will build our faith in Jesus Christ. We need to thank God the Father who says that we have a Father in heaven whereby we are citizens of that glorious family. We need to thank God the Son with whom we are co-heirs. We need to thank God the Holy Spirit who is our companion,

counselor, teacher, intercessor and many more. We also need to thank God for those who have spoken life into our lives of faith. Let us not forget those who pray for us.

3. Be Thankful (Colossians 3:15) - It is an act of the will. One can choose to be thankful or can choose to complain. One can choose to cherish what God has given or choose to chase after the wind and in the process, grumble, blame and wonder why they are not given what they desire. I Thessalonians 5:18 says 'giving thanks in all circumstances'.

We are always needful people but in it we can choose to be thankful. Count your blessings, name them one by one.

What is your choice today? What is your habit - grumble and complain or be thankful and peaceful? What are the habits or family culture we teach our children? BE THANKFUL.

#### Visit to Ullavoor



A small group of volunteers from our congregation visited a group of families in Ullavoor, a small village in Kancheepuram District near Chengelpet. It was an experience that gave us an opportunity to show God's concern and love for less fortunate people. Twenty one families belonging to the Irullar community rescued from bonded labour from brick kilns live there in a small area between two cemeteries. The people have been brutalised and exploited in every manner conceivable. To this community released from bonded labour through the good work of an NGO, some of us went, to share the joy of Christmas.

'Do you know what is special about December'? 'Have you heard about Christmas'? The answer to these two questions by the residents of Ullavoor was a resounding "No". Eagerness to learn was however evident in the smiles of all around us.

As we entered their colony, we heard sounds of drums beating and prayers for healing from one of the huts. Soon the prayers stopped and all inhabitants gathered to hear the great story of our Saviour's birth and the plan of redemption of mankind from the slavery of sin. This was narrated in fluent Tamil by Mrs. Diana Paulraj. The children of this colony hear the Gospel every Sunday from the Pastor of a Church who visits them. Some sang songs worshipping our Lord Jesus Christ. This convinced us that if we are open to the Lord's prompting, we can reach the Gospel to them eventually.

We gave them everyday necessities like mats, bed sheets, towels, toiletries, steel plates, plastic containers etc. This is our third visit to this community. On our earlier visits, we got to know the residents, their socio-economic status and their needs. Our church has sanctioned a sum of money towards water connection and laying of water pipe lines. This project is yet to commence. None of this help was asked for, but we assessed the need by interacting with them. Kindly pray that this project should be completed without delay.

One of the changes noticed was, they had planted flowering plants and some trees near their houses and goats were being reared by some families. The children go to nearby schools but some of them discontinue as they are not accepted by other children in their classes. The ladies have formed themselves into self help groups and they have opened bank accounts. The Panchayat Chairman has been very helpful to them, yet they have a long way to go to be self sufficient even in a small measure. They are willing to earn through hard work rather than depend on charity. Vocational guidance and family counselling are the crying need of the hour to uplift them socially.

It is our prayer that one day this community will know the Lord Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour and we can play a small part in their spiritual and economic transformation. May we all pray that the Lord should open more doors for our congregation to serve those in need such as these.

## I feel Only, That's Lonely – The Art of Being Alone

Chronic loneliness (Being & Feeling lonely for a long time) is a modern -day epidemic. More & more people are complaining of chronic loneliness ad specially those who have moved to bigger cities from smaller cities. A Clinical Psychologist of Fortis Hiranandani Hospital, Mumbai states that there has been a 3 fold increase in patients experiencing chronic loneliness. Loneliness doesn't necessarily require physical solitude, but rather absence of connection, closeness, kinship; inability to find as much intimacy as desired.

One can feel lonely anywhere, but loneliness that comes from feeling alone in a big city despite living cheek-by-jowl with so many people is a different thing altogether. Loneliness is not about whether we live alone, it's about feeling alone, says psychologist John Cacioppo of the University of Chicago, US.

Nobody knew this phenomenon in India but today people are becoming more isolated- the need for privacy is increasing and tolerance for compromise is reducing. There is an exponential increase in nuclear families and singles and joint families do not exist anymore. Erratic schedules, lack of meaningful relationships, break ups, increasing workloads, long commuting hours and the pressure/need to prove one's worth through materialism, too, have resulted in people distancing themselves from others. Besides lack of empathy and time for each other, experts blame the dual character of the online world for fuelling chronic loneliness." If used as a tool to enrich and increase the frequency of face-to-face interactions, social media tends to be associated with lower levels of loneliness. But if you look at it as a replacement for the face-to-face, it can flood you with loneliness.

A study published in the journal of Developmental Psychology states that the possibility of loneliness increases higher at the age of 30. A sense of lack of purpose and dissatisfaction with life that typically occurs during early adulthood can make loneliness creep in. The world gives remedies to this by having a pet dog, connecting with others, pursuing things which give inner joy, indulging in creative activities,

- etc. But the Bible states it in a different manner. Three Learnings of how the Bible teaches us to deal with loneliness in our lives are:
- (1) God says I am your Best Friend in Loneliness- Tell yourself "God says you are not alone- I will not leave you nor forsake you. (Heb13:5)" Elijah was lonely as he was running away from Jezebel God said "What are you doing here? "God fed him and he came out of his loneliness syndrome. Daniel was all alone all people tried to corner him but finally God saved him from the lions in the den & gave him a high position. When you focus on a problem, you get more problems when you focus on possibilities, you get more opportunities through God. Even when the WHOLE WORLD IS AGAINST YOU, you feel to be in a minority, GOD SAYS I AM WITH YOU, THAT IS SUFFICIENT FOR A MAJORITY GOD (Rom 8:31) 'What a Friend we have in Jesus' song sums it up that Jesus is the best friend yesterday, today and forever.
- (2) God says Have Fellowship with Fellow Believers- In today's world because of the electronic gadget/virtual way of communication through email / what's up & sms-people have forgotten the face to face way of communication. The Bible clearly states that we should not give up the habit of fellowship with fellow Christians (Hebrew 10:19-25) & have a one on one communication. Simeon of Jerusalem longed to see baby Jesus's face before his death- the idea is to have a direct communication with the Lord. The Bible talks about OUR PRIVILEGE OF seeing our Lord face to face IN HEAVEN- WHAT a PROMISE SO WONDERFUL!!(I Cor. 13:12)
- (3) God calls us for a time of solitude with Him- God calls us to have a time of communion with the Lord every day in solitude. Solitude makes you available to the Lord for Bible study and prayer a Quiet Time of meditation. There is a difference between solitude and loneliness because loneliness is when you feel alone and neglected/ unwanted in the fast world or in a party get together but solitude is making yourself alone to have time with the Lord. Daniel closed the doors to pray to Almighty 3 times a day. God calls us to lead a Purpose Driven Life by having time with Him every day. That is why we sing "TAKE TIME TO BE HOLY- SPEAK OFT WITH THY LORD" it is for our benefit for God's grace & mercy to be upon us every day.

If we continuously are aware that we need the counsel of the Holy Spirit and are in the presence of God & seek His knowledge – we will always never be alone- but walk with God as Enoch did. We need to remember as God says- we are here to glorify the creator and sustainer

of Life and to lead a life of living sacrifice for the Lord then we will never feel lonely – because we are in the right environment, with the right people & right circumstances. Because we are leaning on His everlasting arms, let us approach 2017 by "Trusting Him as there is no other way but to Trust & Obey, to be happy in Jesus.

#### **Passion Flower**



In 1608, Spanish Jesuits formally presented Pope Paul V with a drawing and dried specimens of the passion flower discovered in Peru - the flower with the five wounds. The Spaniards who had first discovered the passion flower in South America called it 'Christ's thorns'.

The Anglicized name, "passion" flower refers to the Crucifixion of Jesus Christ. The name and the flower itself are filled with symbolism. The five petals and the five sepals are said to represent the 10 faithful apostles (omitting Peter and Judas). The tips of the leaves suggest the point of the centurion's spear. The central flower column denotes the pillar of the scourging. The flower's tendrils resemble the whips used in the flagellation. The corona filaments are compared to Christ's crown of thorns. The three stigmas are called the nails, and the five anthers reflect the five sacred wounds, while the red stains recall the blood of Christ.

Passion flower is the national flower of Paraguay. Bolivia has two national flowers –Flower of Paradise and Passion Flower. The flower comes in different colours- the one that was presented to the Pope was the blue variety.

The passion flower remains a recognized symbol of Christ's passion. The Victorian stained glass window theme features the passion flower, as do church ritual instruments including the altar frontal and the lectern fall.

Recently got the bill for the Passion fruit from a shop in Chennai mentioning it as Fashion fruit.

### The Journey of the Kirk

History is always interesting with its facts and figures, but what's more interesting is to be part of it and to see it with our very own eyes!

A rewind to 196 years of this beautiful Church we belong to could speak volumes of its rich heritage and architecture, and the seeds of love & deeds sown by the devoted congregations gone by!

St. Andrew's Kirk (St. Andrew's Church) is one of the many fascinating monuments that adorn the streets of Chennai. Its architecturally majestic design ranges from a towering spire to majestic columns and a magnificent dome.

Rev. Dr. John Alan, the first Minister of Kirk, established the Church of Scotland Congregation to serve the Scottish community in Madras (Chennai).

Kirk in Scottish means the Church. Construction of this magnificent Church started on 6 April 1818, and the church was consecrated on 25 February 1821. Its design was inspired by St. Martin-in-the-Fields Church, London. The arduous work of building the Kirk, was executed by Major Thomas Fort de Havilland and Col. James Caldwell and tirelessly supervised by the first Minister, Rev. Dr. John Allen. This church is often referred to as 'the Queen of Scottish Churches in the East'

Imagine Rev. Dr. John Allen standing and supervising this vast area of marshy low-land that was subject to sinking and flooding! His countless prayers and day and night watch over this magnificent construction for nearly 3 years, resulted in the raising of this work of art!

The 14 ft foundation of the Kirk sits on a bed of pottery and brick wells 9 ft deep. The total of 150 wells were set close to each other-150 wells with no modern day machinery. The well diggers had to labour hard and digging under water is no joke!

The steeple rises 166 ft above the floor of the Kirk. History records, on 8th May 1820 the steeple was completed and on the eleventh, only three days after, the steeple was hit by a most violent storm! The wind blew with great violence for thirty hours during which period sixteen inches of rain fell in Madras. Rev. Dr. John Allen who then resided at the Manse and the workers would have had a really long night! The steeple resisted the whole storm unhurt!

The marvel that catches one's eye as one enters the Kirk is the huge dome that stands tall at 51.5 ft in diameter from the inside. To add to the architectural marvel, the dome has a framework of only bricks filled in with masonry. The blue interior formed by crushed sea shells mixed with lapis lazuli (semi-precious stone) gives the impression of an azure sky (that is) the canopy of heaven. The dome rests on sixteen fluted Corinthian columns.

The Kirk's uniqueness is heightened by its pipe organ and the rendering of anthems by its choir. The enormous pipe organ in olive green and intricate woodwork in burnished gold was built in New Yorkshire, England. It was installed in 1883.

The Kirk is characterised by its black and white checkered marble floor, and beautiful mahogany wood work. Its interior is circular with teak and rattan pews arranged in a semi circular pattern facing the altar.

The stone pulpit was a gift from Mr. & Mrs. James Short used for the first time in October 1909.

Facts about this beautiful astounding master piece can be researched and written in volumes. The fact remains that history has gifted us and the ones gone by with a beautiful haven to worship our Lord almighty.

196 years forward, we have found our Lord's grace and mercy in reaching out to our outreach projects and various ministries through this Church touching lives, raising missionaries, spreading countless smiles. Yes, the hard labour, the sacrifices, the dedication, the seeds sown have seen wonderful harvest in Christ Jesus through the years. They continue to be sown for generations to come. Yes, we are moving on as a congregation with a vision of obedient disciples of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

#### **Medical Corner**

### This amazing world In colour

Doctor treats but Jesus heals

Do you know that colour vision is a God given gift only to human beings, apes, monkeys, some birds, certain species of fish and insects? Most of the other animals see colours differently from the way we do. Crocodiles see colours, in varying shades of grey and bees can see ultra violet rays which are invisible to the human eye!

However we need sunlight or artificial light to see colour! Have you gone out for a walk in moon light? everything will appear in various shades of grey. In total darkness, we cannot see anything. On the other hand owls and some animals that hunt at night have extremely large eyes and pupils, which provide excellent vision in dim light.Cats also have good night vision.

The retina, which is the inner most photosensitive layer of the eye is comparable to the film roll inside a camera. The retina has two kinds of cells "rods" and "cones." The rods play a role in night vision and the cones are responsible for colour vision. Defects in the cones lead to different kinds of colour blindness, whereas Vitamin A deficiency can lead to night blindness!

Carrots, papaya, drumsticks, green leafy vegetables, drumstick leaves, fish, fish liver oils, liver, milk, cheese, butter and eggs are good sources of Vitamin A and regular intake of these will prevent night blindness.

#### Is it God's Will?

## What College should I attend? What subject should I study? Whom should I marry? What job should

I seek? What should I do with my life?

#### 1. What does Scripture say?

This is the most important question. Too often Christians look for a supernatural revelation on a specific choice they are facing instead of searching the Scriptures to see what God has already revealed. You must begin scripture because it is God's revelation.

"All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness" (2 Timothy 3:16).

#### 2. Are you becoming the person Cod wants you to be?

As you search the Scriptures, you will see that God is far more interested in the kind of person you are than in what you do or where you go. In Luke 6:45, Jesus pointed out that character determines action: "A good man brings good things out of the good stored up in his heart." So, when faced with any choice, you must ask both whether your motivation is Christlike and whether a decision will help or hinder the development of Christlikeness within you.

#### 5. What are your gifts and talents?

Scripture says that God gives all Christians spiritual gifts: "Now to each one the manifestation of die Spirit is given for the common good" (1 Corinthians 12:7). When you make decisions, you should take both your spiritual gifts and your natural talents into consideration, for these may indicate what God wants you to do.

## 4. What do your Christian parents, mentors and friends encourage you to consider?

The Lord has placed people in your life for a purpose. They know you and understand your character, gifts and talents. Part of discerning the will of God is listening to them.

### 5. What circumstances are you going through that may provide direction?

Circumstances can prepare you for what God wants to do in your life. Yes, God is working through the circumstances of your life! They are more than coincidences, they are God incidences!

#### 6. Have you received supernatural revelation?

How wonderful it would be if God would speak audibly to us every time and tell us what to do! Scripture tells us that He does that on occasion. Look at Moses (Exodus 3) or Isaiah (Isaiah 6), or the apostle Paul (Acts 9). Such supernatural revelation is not the general rule, however, and none of the persons mentioned above were looking for a supernatural revelation. Be open to however God wishes to manifest Himself to you.

#### 7. What impressions come to your heart as you worship?

The first Christians experienced the leading of the Holy Spirit through prayer (Acts 10:9), reading God's Word (Acts 1:20), community sessions of worship (Acts 13:1-3), and visions (Actsl0:3-10).

#### 8. What do you want to do?

"Take delight in the Lord and He will give you the desires of your heart" (Psalm 37:4) Ask yourself, "What do I want to do with my life? What do I really get excited about?" If the Lord gives you the desires of your heart, then you must have some desires to begin with. In other words, your own choices may be God's way of guiding you.
