Value of Persistence

But those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint. (Isaiah 40:31)

Great things take time to make and great achievements are accomplished after much struggle, resilience and patient pursuit. It is not that God takes pleasure in making us wait but in the waiting, God transforms us in ways we will not learn any other way. There are many examples in the Bible of men and women who changed only for the better when they waited on God, waited for God and waited in the presence of God. Jacob (means deceiver) was a completely different man by the time he reached Egypt because he learned invaluable lessons in the journey of life. The expression of Job, one who perhaps experienced deepest sorrow, after his encounter with God in Job 41 is different from the previous chapters.

As we study on Persistent Prayer through this month, we will study three lessons that will help us seek God continually as a lifestyle.

1. God loves to our fellowship – Genesis 3:8 says " And they heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and Adam and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees of the garden.' Revelation 21:3 says " And I heard a loud voice from heaven saying, "Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and He will dwell with them, and they shall be His people. God Himself will be with them and be their God.' Even in the earthly life of Jesus, the Master spent a huge part of His life only with His disciples. Very often, we think about worship as an expression of our joy to God. How often we fail to realise that it is His joy that pours into our



- souls. Persistent prayer is not so much of repeatedly asking God for the same need but instilling in our minds of our need of Him, for without Him, we are nothing.
- 2. God loves our faith - Romans 10:17 says 'So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.' Matthew 8 records one of the most amazing declarations of Jesus when He spoke about the faith of the Roman Centurion. He said that He had not seen such great faith in all of Israel. This is a great testimony not only of the faith of the Centurion but also about how much that filled the heart of Jesus with joy and gladness. This is not meant to be an exception for the children of God but the norm. Faith is not something to be self-generated but one that comes from God through the word of God. Persistent prayer in itself is a sign of a person's faith because one confesses his dependence on God in spite of happenings of life. Time to pray through times of struggle is an evidence of strong inward faith in the person and power of the Almighty God.
- 3. God loves our faithful living Prayer is not something to be looked in isolation. Dependence is always to be coupled with a life of obedience. Noah's journey of building the ark, preaching about the flood and preparing his family is a great life lesson of balancing multiple responsibilities. Is it easy? No. Is it possible? Yes. Matthew 25 records an amazing parable of the talents and two out of the three servants were rewarded by the Master after he said 'Well done, good and faithful servant.' The Master took time to come but that did not deter the faithful servants from continuing a lifestyle of persistent obedience and patient obedience. Proverbs 23:18 says 'For surely there is a hereafter, And your hope will not be cut off.'

Walk of discipleship will have many challenges and very often it will challenge the core of our relationship with our Triune God. God does not change in time and He will not abandon those who look to Him. Stay persistent in prayer, faith and obedience, you will have a sure reward.

A Report on AKCDC Project

The Andrew's Kirk Child Development Centre, with its acronym AKCDC, is a study centre situated amidstthe Kirk cemetery located behind the Govt.General Hospitalfor the underprivileged children, residing in around the slums of Sathyavani Muthu Nagar.

The AKCDC was started in the year1998in partnership with Compassion International. Since April 2017, the project is funded and managed by the members of the Church. Children from the age group of 5 to 22 years come to the Centre after their school hours and are coached by the staff in their studies. Every day, they are provided with milk and nutritious dinner. At present there are 104 registered children, out of which 64 are girls and 40 are boys.

The mission of the Church project is "touplift the highly vulnerable and underprivileged childrenand develop them physically, spiritually, cognitively, and socio-emotionally, thereby encouraging them to be responsible and independent citizens and followers of the Lordand Saviour Jesus Christ".

A well-plannedtimetable is scheduled forevery day.Mrs. Annamary, the Project Manager, along with other teachers and two cooking staff do a wonderful job. Physical and online tuitions along with classes for chess and Hindi provides an environment for overall growth.

The Word of God is given priority every day with a time of prayer, devotion and songs. Children bagged prizes at the recent Bible quiz competition at the Kirk. VBS and Christmas celebrations are always a time of joy and are well attended.

Parents retreat, teensmeet, skill development programs, tailoring classes, medical check-ups andcareer guidance classes are among some of the programs that are conducted periodically.Most recently, an interest has been created amongthe college boys for taking up playing football.

The sponsors play a vital role in meeting out the basic necessities of fees and food. What was once an uneducated slum has become a place where you find first generationstudents and graduates pursuing their studies in the fieldsof engineering, law, nursing, and with aspirations to serve in the government.

We thank and paise God for His faithfulness and His sufficiency thus far. We solicit your prayers for the children's studies, safety, and to stay strong in the Lord.

The Past Present and Future..... The Road Ahead for our Evangelism & Missions Movement

Greetings to the family of Kirk, We are grateful for the Lord's faithful guidance in all of our outreaches throughout 2024. Through Prayer and dedication, our E&MM leaders at the respective mission fields, have been able to reach the unreached, share the love of Christ with fervour. We are also thankful for all the support our congregation has extended to all of these efforts. As we step into the New year, When we look at the road ahead the core truth remains unchanged: Evangelism starts in our hearts. The question is, how can each of us, within our distinct cultural contexts, fully engage with the entire narrative of Scripture to bring about lasting and deep transformation in both society and the individuals within it?

We live in the present, but the Bible clearly teaches that the past, present, and future must all be understood together if we are to lead a balanced, Christcentered life. Living in a way that reflects God's love and righteousness is the best way to draw others to Him, even if it's just out of curiosity. When the time is right for someone to open their heart and accept God's message—or at least listen—God will make that happen. It's important to remember that we don't bring people to God ourselves; rather, God works through each of us to lead them to Him. To paraphrase Paul, the one who plants the seed and the one who waters it do their part, but it is God who makes it grow.

While the core message of sharing our Lord's love remains unchanged, the unique nature of each mission field and the diverse communities we serve requires us to adopt specific and tailored approaches. For example, how we engage with the community in Gypsy Colony is vastly different from our approach in Perumbakkam or in Kosappur. Each community has its own cultural, social, and spiritual context that demands a thoughtful and individualised strategy. This principle holds true for all of our mission fields—there is no one-size-fits-all formula. It requires a unique method, guided by understanding their particular needs and circumstances, while always staying true to the Gospel's timeless message.

A. Cultural Contextualization

Each of our Mission field community is unique, the individuals with their own traditions, values, and struggles. We are constantly

seeking how the timeless truths of Scripture can be shared in a way that speaks directly to these cultural nuances. It's not about changing the message but presenting it in a form that resonates deeply with the people in their own context.

B. Holistic Transformation

Transformation isn't just spiritual but must affect every area of life. We need to engage in efforts that not only evangelize but also address the physical, emotional, and social needs of individuals and communities. Whether it's through education, health initiatives, or advocacy for justice, the gospel speaks to every part of human life.

C. Community Empowerment

Encouraging and equipping individuals within each community to not just receive the gospel but to live it out in their daily lives. Transformation often happens when people are empowered to take ownership of their faith and engage actively within their communities creating a much powerful transformation achieved through community empowerment.

D. Storytelling as Mission

The Bible itself is a story that unfolds from creation to redemption. Teaching and modelling how the entire narrative of Scripture connects with the daily human story. Showing how the gospel is not just a set of principles to live by but the fulfilment of humanity's deepest needs and longings.

E. Discipleship and Mentorship

Real transformation happens in the context of relationships. Fostering environments of discipleship where individuals can grow in their understanding of Scripture, live it out in community, and be equipped to share it with others.

F. Praying for Wisdom and Unity

As we move forward, we continue to seek God's wisdom and guidance through prayer, asking Him to give clarity on how best to reach the unreached in the diverse contexts. Unity in purpose and mission being the key to move forward effectively.Being receptive to God's guidance has led us to the right places at the right times, allowing our outreach leaders to share His truth with those in need. Continue to pray, and uphold, participate as the Lord leads you to fulfil the Great Commission He has bestowed upon all of us.

St Andrew's Village Project – Report on the Tailoring Certification Program

One of the community improvement initiatives that the St. Andrew's Church is involved in, is the Village Project in the northern suburbs of the city, in a handful of villages around Ponneri taluk. Our intent is to reach the people around us with the gospel of Jesus Christ in deference to the Great Commission. As we collectively work to fulfil this mandate, often, we find that there are critical needs that we, as a congregation could help with, that plug some of the gaps in the sustenance and livelihood of the communities who we work with.

For the members of the Church who areactively involved with the neighbourhoodoutreach projects from the above perspective, it may come as no surprise that the impact that it creates in the lives of those who are touched by the ministries and programs is powerful and far-reaching, sometimes even altering the course of their lives.

The community projects under the Village Project Centre are great examples of such life-altering events. The Centre and the two campuses at Thirupalaivanam and Karanodai offer a beacon of hope to the needy and poorer sections of the society at these locations and the dedicated and committed staff and volunteers make a perceptible difference in the lives of such people who live in proximity to these centres.

One such program is the tailoring course that is of immense benefit to the women residing near the two centres. With the help of a qualified staff member, a 6-month certification course in tailoring and embroidery was designed a few years back. Every year, two batches graduate. On the 19th of Jan 2025, it was a privilege for a handful of committee members to visit and present certificates to 54 women who completed the course during 2024 in two batches. Listening to their testimonies and the empowerment they felt with the newly acquired skill set was a reflective and insightful experience. After receiving certification at the end of six months, they are able to secure employment or provide a livelihood for themselves and their families. Very recently, the staff have tied up with a local garment export promotion unit for providing a steady demand stream.

More than 500 such beneficiaries from our tailoring course are currently residing in different parts of our city. As most of them are from people of other faiths, we plan to have a one-day retreat during 2025 to provide them with spiritual nourishment. It is our endeavour to schedule the retreats annually or biannually and invite all those who have graduated thus far. Please do keep this initiative in your prayers.

It is indeed aunique opportunity and privilege for me personally, along with some of the members of the Church, to be associated with the Project, to have an appreciation for the term 'faith in action' that is demonstrated by our staff and volunteers and the impact the ministry has on the communities nearby.

It is the mandate and responsibility of each of our congregation members to be looking out for the interests of others apart from their own (Phil 2:4) and to reach out to the needy in our spheres of our influence, in obedience to the call of our Master!

It is our prayer that, as a congregation of believers, we strive to renew, transform, and restore the communities in which we are placed.





Know Your Law

Audi alteram partem is a Latin maxim that means "listen to the other side" or "let the other side be heard". It is a legal principle that ensures all parties in a dispute have a fair chance to present their case.

What does it mean?

No one should be judged without a fair hearing.

All parties should be given the opportunity to respond to evidence against them.

Each party has the right to be informed of the charges against them.

Each party has the right to call witnesses and cross-examine witnesses called by the other side.

Why is it important?

It is a fundamental principle of natural justice.

It is a basic requirement of the rule of law.

It ensures fairness and impartiality in legal and administrative proceedings.

Know your Hymn

"All Things Bright and Beautiful" - Cecil Frances Alexander

"All Things Bright and Beautiful" is one of the most beloved hymns celebrated for its joyful praise of God's creation. Written by the Irish poet and hymn writer Cecil Frances Alexander in 1848, it is universally sung in church services, schools, and other gatherings

Cecil Frances Alexander (1818–1895) was a prolific hymn writer from Ireland. She was deeply influenced by her Christian faith and sought to make theological concepts accessible to children. Her hymns often reflected her love of nature and a desire to teach Biblical truths through simple yet profound language.

Alexander was married to William Alexander, who later became the Archbishop. She dedicated much of her life to charitable work, particularly helping the poor and the deaf. Among her other wellknown hymns are "Once in Royal David's City" and "There Is a Green Hill Far Away."

"All Things Bright and Beautiful" is part of Alexander's collection Hymns for Little Children, published in 1848. The hymns in this book were intended to explain aspects of the Apostles' Creed to children. This particular hymn was written to illustrate the phrase "Maker of heaven and earth," emphasizing God's role as the Creator of all things.

The hymn reflects Alexander's appreciation for the natural world and her belief that every part of creation is a testament to God's glory. Its vivid imagery, from "the purple-headed mountain" to "the ripe fruits in the garden," helps us to see the divine in the everyday beauty of the world.

The hymn celebrates the beauty, diversity, and intricacy of creation. Each stanza highlights different aspects of nature, from majestic mountains to small creatures, affirming that everything in the world—no matter how grand or humble—is a reflection of God's handiwork. The refrain, "All things bright and beautiful, all creatures great and small," is an expression of gratitude for the wonders of the natural world.

Over the years, "All Things Bright and Beautiful" has been set to several tunes, the most famous being the melody by William H. Monk, known as Royal Oak. The hymn's cheerful tone has made it a favorite in schools, Sunday services, and community events.

Through its simple yet powerful words, Cecil Frances Alexander's timeless hymn continues to inspire awe and gratitude for the world around us connecting people to the splendor of creation and the Creator.

Living by the Book: Part 7

Learning how to study the Bible from Dr Howard Hendricks

Having studied the Word through the steps of Observation and Interpretation, what are we going to do about it? We neither begin nor end with Interpretation. The ultimate goal of Bible study is to allow the Bible to do something to us.

"Biblical truth is the wardrobe of the soul" (Hendricks, p.290), but its truth is attractive only when it is applied. Unfortunately, there




are five dead-end streets that we sometimes take in our study of the Word.

- 1. We substitute interpretation for application: With knowledge, comes the responsibility to put it into action. For example, the scribes and Pharisees knew the Old Testament prophecy regarding the Messiah, but never went to Bethlehem to check its truth for themselves. Knowledge without obedience is sin.
- 2. We substitute superficial obedience for substantive life-change: Alternatively, we can apply biblical truth to areas of our lives where it is already being applied, with the result that there is no noticeable change. If we apply the Truth about honesty to our families and our associates, but not to our business practices, we fail to change.
- 3. We substitute rationalisation for repentance: When the truth gets too close, we defend ourselves by rationalising sin instead of repenting of it. It can build up with age, as we find more reasons why the truth applies to everyone but ourselves.
- 4. We substitute an emotional experience for a volitional decision: If emotion is the only response,



- there will be no change; there has to be substantive lifechanging decisions based on what the Scriptures say. Real change begins in the will - when we are not satisfied with just being exposed to the Word or convicted by it.
- 5. We substitute communication for transformation: Being able to speak eloquently or convincingly about Scripture is not sufficient, because God knows our hearts. Instead of hiding behind our words, we have to let the Word pierce deep inside of us.

James gives us the analogy of a mirror: I can look into it and



see that I am a mess, yet go away and do nothing. Or I can be blessed by looking intently at the perfect law and abiding by it, not forgetting but doing. The mirror of God's Word has the power to transform us. We *come* to the Word, using the first two steps of Bible study - Observation and Interpretation. Although applications

may be many, the truth of the Word means that there can be only one ultimate interpretation. The better we understand a passage, the better we can respond. We are *convicted* when the Word highlights our sin and what we need to stop doing. It diagnoses the disease in order to effect a cure. It also *convinces* us to walk in newness of life, by showing us God's provision for what is good. Ultimately, studying the Word this way results in *conversion*, an ongoing process in which we actually begin to live differently, becoming more and more like Christ. True conversion is a change of behaviour, borne out of a change of heart, as a response to what God has shown us in His Word.

This change is likely to result in others sitting up to take note. However, it does not change our essential personhood. As God's workmanship (Ephesians 2:10), we are an intentional creation, fashioned by God for a purpose. Understanding our unique design helps us to understand where we are most effective, so that

we can carry out His purpose for us every single day. We do not have to become someone else, as a result of transformation; rather, we put off the old ways, through our new relationship with Christ. We are the same person, but a new version, an altogether different creation.

This change is not an isolated one, but for the entire community of believers in Christ who are being transformed by Christ. The Word applies to me, but it is not centred around me. I was made to fit into God's plan, which is for the world. "Individually and collectively, the Church engages the world, and the power of God's Word lived out in us impacts whatever sphere of influence God opens for us." (P.316). That is transformation!

COMPUTER VISION SYNDROME

"Doctors treat, but Jesus heals"

Everyone is using the computer now. Some professions require continuous usage of the system for 14 – 18 hours per day. It is scientifically proved that video display terminals do not radiate any harmful rays like ultraviolet rays which can harm the eyes.

Some people experience difficulty in focussing distant objects after prolonged near work on the system. Eye ache, tiredness of the eyes, heaviness of head, intolerance to light, double vision, burning sensation, dryness of eyes and sometimes excess of watering is experienced. This is known as Computer Vision Syndrome (C.V.S). They may also have headache, neck pain and backache due to improper posture for prolonged periods of time.

The reasons for C.V.S are many.Wrong sitting posture; room light being too dim or too bright; not blinking for long durations of time; wearing incorrect spectacle power and small uncorrected refractive error.Normal blink rate is approximately 22 times a minute.When we read, the rate is about 10 times a minute.Computer users only blink 7 times a minute causing dry eyes.

Precautions:People who need to use the system for long durations of time must get their eyes checked every 6 months.Anti-glare (anti reflection coating) glasses must be worn.Spectacle powers can be customised for the terminal since this distance is different for different people.Regular eye exercises are mandatory.Moving the eyes in various directions 10 times (once a day) must be done every day.Lubricating eye drops can be used for dry eyes.Palming the eye and taking a break to look at a distant object every 10 minutes can decrease the symptoms.Neck exercises can be done to relieve neck pain.

Annual General Assembly (AGM)


